Respectful communication is a right

In all workplaces people have the right to feel respected. Unacceptable and offensive behaviour has no place in our school communities.

To ensure the wellbeing of students, staff and the community in our schools, steps will be taken to address unacceptable behaviour. This may include restricting contact with the school community or, in more serious cases, referral to NSW Police.

Unacceptable behaviour may include but is not limited to:

- Aggressive or intimidating actions, such as violence, threatening gestures or physical proximity.
- Aggressive or intimidating language, including the use of obscenities, making sexist, racist or derogatory comments or using a rude tone.
- Treating members of the school community differently due to aspects such as their religion or disability.
- Inappropriate and time wasting communication.

The Melbourne Declaration on Educational Goals for Young Australians (2008) acts as a national guide for educational policy, practice and delivery in Australian schools. The Melbourne Declaration is important in that it provides the basis of the Australian Curriculum. Its two main goals include:

1. The promotion of equity and excellence in Australian schools

2. That all young Australians become successful learners, confident and creative individuals and active and informed citizens.

The Melbourne Declaration was the first formal recognition in Australia that schooling has a broader role to play in the development of students, above and beyond academic outcomes.

Old Focus: Academic = Knowledge (i.e thinking) + Skills (i.e. doing)

Research evidence shows higher levels of wellbeing are associated with a range of positive outcomes, including: academic outcomes; better mental health; and a more prosocial, responsible lifestyle. This lead to Department of Education's strategic goal that 'every student is known, valued and cared for.

Additional Focus: Wellbeing = Affective (i.e attitudes & feelings)

As outlined, there an Inextricable link exist between wellbeing and learning in the context of schooling. Social and emotional factors influence academic achievement (Murphy & Holste 2016; Wang, Haertel & Walberg 1997), largely via the contributions that they make to motivation and attention. This, over recent years, has contributed to an increased focus on education for the whole child.

New Focus: Whole Child = Wellbeing + Academic

In addition to the increased focus on student wellbeing to drive student outcomes, an important part of the equation is the wellbeing of the hard working and dedicated staff group at Leeton High School.

I was alarmed to read, in the latest annual Australian Principal OH&S and Wellbeing survey released last week that 45 percent of principals were threatened with violence in 2018, and 37 percent were attacked. This represents a steady rise and the highest levels since the survey began in 2011. Without having any evidence at hand, similar results could sadly conceivably be expected for our teachers.

It is important that we as a school community focus on strategies and approaches to create a supportive learning environment which enables our teachers to feel safe to teach and our students to feel safe to learn. A safe environment is one where the risk of harm is minimised to all stakeholders in the school community.

Physical violence in any form, against anyone, at Leeton High School is not tolerated and is dealt with immediately and in line with the NSW Department of Education's suspension and expulsion policies and

procedures. Addressing the underlying (antecedent) reasons/triggers which cause students to behave inappropriately are also simultaneously addressed through a range of measures (via 'teaching'), which include, but is not limited to the following:

-Leeton High School Wellbeing Policy

-Positive Behaviour For Learning framework

-Student Improvement Plans

-Time out cards

-Mentoring

-Provision of a School Counsellor (James Brown) & Psychologist (Sandra Richardson)

-Headspace small group initiative (starting in Term 2)



To ensure that we continue to provide a safe learning for our school community, I take this opportunity to request that all parents report to the front office in the event that you need to communicate with, or collect your son/daughter from school.

In conclusion, despite being the Deputy Principal responsible for Teaching and Learning, I have hopefully outlined for you, the important and interconnected link between student wellbeing and student learning outcomes. To this end, all students are therefore encouraged to participate in the upcoming 'Tell Them From Me Survey', which will provide our school with immediate and actionable data on how our students are travelling on a range of wellbeing measures. This information is also used when reviewing our teaching and learning programs and decision making on how and where to allocate staffing and financial resources in the short, medium and long term. Any parent, who **does not** wish for the son or daughter to participate in the survey, are encouraged to complete and return the following 'non-consent form' to the school.

Tell Them From Me student survey: Information and consent form for parents and carers

Dear Parents and Carers

In Term 1 2019, our school is taking part in the *Tell Them From Me* student survey. The survey will provide us with valuable feedback on what our students think about school life, how engaged they are with school and the different ways that teachers interact with them. Schools in Australia and around the world have used the *Tell Them From Me* survey to help them improve. The survey is completed on-line and is run by an independent research company, **The Learning Bar**, which specialises in school-based surveys.

Staff in schools will <u>not</u> be able to identify individual students from their responses. To ensure confidentiality, participating students will receive a unique username and password. Where fewer than five students respond to a question, the results will be suppressed. The survey typically takes 30 minutes or less to complete and will be administered by the school during normal school hours. Once the surveys are completed by students, reports are prepared and in most cases are available to schools within three business days.

As well as schools getting student feedback, the Department of Education, through the Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation (CESE), has access to data from across NSW and is running a research project to look at state-wide patterns of student wellbeing, engagement and effective teaching practices. The research is looking at how these things impact on student outcomes, including academic performance. Individual students will **not** be identified in any CESE publications, and all information will be handled in accordance with the relevant privacy legislation. Students' personal information will not be disclosed by the department to any other person or body other than as required by law.

This research will help schools in New South Wales to better understand how to improve student wellbeing and engagement. It will also help teachers and principals discuss what works to improve student outcomes.

Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary. Your child will not take part if either you or your child do not wish. If, during the survey, your child is uncomfortable, he/she can choose to stop the survey at any time. The majority of questions in the survey can be skipped.

If you <u>do not want</u> your child to take part in the survey, please complete the attached form and return it to the school by <u>Monday 18 March 2019</u>.


