Year 9 Check-in assessment – Reading and Numeracy

The Check-in assessment is an optional online reading and numeracy assessment for students in Years 5 and 9. The check-in assessments will be available to schools in Term 3, Weeks 5 to 7 (17th August to 4th September 2020). Leeton High School has 'opted in' to the Check-in assessment. Students in Year 9 will undertake the check-in assessments in reading and numeracy in English and Mathematics classes during the testing period.

The check-in assessments supplement existing school practices to identify how students are performing in literacy and numeracy and to help teachers tailor their teaching more specifically to student needs.

The Check-in assessments are mapped to the NSW Syllabuses and National Literacy and Numeracy Learning Progressions.

The Check-in assessment includes two online assessments for students:

- reading assessment
- numeracy assessment

The Big Watermelon Experiment: Physics, Forces and Flying Fruit

This August, schools across the nation will be imploding watermelons in the name of scientific discovery. The Big Watermelon Experiment was inspired by a popular YouTube challenge and seeks to answer once and for all the question: How many rubber bands does it take to implode a watermelon?

To celebrate National Science Week (15-23 August), Leeton High school is participating in this large scale science event which is being coordinated by Experimentary — a science education website run by former TV scientist Dr Rob Bell. "While imploding watermelons might not sound highly scientific, there is definitely some science in there ... and we'll be using a lot of scientific principles along the way, and it is a lot of fun," Dr Rob said.

Schools receive learning materials, including videos and fact sheets to download. Before the experiment, students at each school will predict how many rubber bands they think will implode their watermelons based on the scientific principles outlined in the learning material.

RESPECTFUL

During National Science Week, each school will conduct the experiment and share images and results on a national scale to compare the data. Our school plans to conduct the Watermelon Experiment at Lunch time on Thursday of Week 5. Students are very excited about it.

It's not just our school excited about the obliterated watermelons, Australian science icon **Dr Karl** loved the idea too and agreed to be the patron of the event. **Woolworths** have also come on board by providing schools with gift cards for their watermelons. And **Melons Australia** have offered to run an online talk with a watermelon farmer and seeds to be sent to schools after the event.

Why watermelons?

The watermelon implosion experiment is visually spectacular, giving students an exciting look into the world of science without the need for expensive equipment or complicated processes. For the media, it is an engaging and interesting way to talk about science – everyday objects being used to discuss science concepts (and of course it goes everywhere!).

What is Experimentary?

Experimentary is an online science resource for primary and middle school-aged children. Experimentary teaches science through experiments, helping teachers and parents deliver science to their students/children in an interesting and interactive way. In a broader sense, Experimentary is making a valuable contribution to the enhancement of STEM education in Australian schools, assisting teachers in science delivery and fostering a love of science in students.

Experimentary has recently been chosen as one of the 14 Future Minds Accelerator (FMA) start-ups. FMA is a brand-new Education Technology Start-up Accelerator, backed by Rio Tinto with support from Amazon Web Services.
